

Insect Repellent


Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents. When used as directed, EPAregistered insect repellents are proven safe and effective.

Registered repellents have an EPA registration number on the package.

If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and repellent second.



Combination sunscreen/insect repellent products are not recommended.

COMMON REPELLENT INGREDIENTS

- DEET
- Picaridin
- IR3535
- Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus
- Others (see EPA website)

Read the label to check:

- For an EPA-registration number.
- Any age restrictions (some products should not be used on very young children).
- Whether the product works against mosquitoes or ticks or both.
- How long the product will work, and how often to reapply.

Apply to exposed skin - do not apply under clothing. Always read the label!

Do you hike, camp, or spend a lot of time outdoors?

Permethrin is effective against mosquitoes and ticks. You can apply to clothing and gear before using. Permethrin products are not meant to be applied directly to skin.
